I visited PM Macleod in hospital just before I left for Kuala Lumpur and he was so looking forward to witnessing his grandson being initiated into Lodge Ness. I hope and trust that on the night of his Initiation that the Lodge will be packed out as a fitting tribute to the candidate's grandfather.

Our thoughts and prayers at this sad time are with his wife Jean and the extended family.

During the recess I have had the privilege of attending meetings in Kuala Lumpur, in Singapore, in Victoria and in New South Wales. Without exception the attendances were good and the Degree work was excellent making the whole trip a real pleasure.

Two things that caught my notice in quite a number of the Lodges was that they were attracting a significant number of younger men and that attendances were strong. On speaking to many of the Brethren it became obvious that one of the plus factors in those Lodges was the involvement of the members wives through their presence at Harmony's and at regular social events within the Lodges – perhaps it is time that we gave some thought and consideration to following their example.

Another plus factor for me, especially in the Lodges in Victoria, was the amount of involvement by all Brethren present at Degrees through the use of music. There is a significant amount of singing in each Degree – far more than we have at home – and as one highly respected Past Master pointed out to me – the constant use of music makes all Brethren feel involved in every Degree – and that has to be a good thing.

Excerpts from the Past -

This article appeared in the February 2005 edition:

Bro William Grigor Macintosh passed on to the Grand Lodge above on 3<sup>rd</sup> January 2005 and a funeral service was held in the Congregational Church in Avoch on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> January 2005. Bro Macintosh will be remembered near and far for his devotion to the memory of Sir Alexander Mackenzie who is buried at the Church of Scotland in Avoch.

Bro John Patience PM has prepared the following article on Bro Macintosh.

Grigor was born on 23 March 1916 and would have been 89 years old in March. He worked on the Corselet Farm and thereafter as a driver and general factotum for D Macleman, Merchant and his associated family farm. In 1935 he joined the Territorial Army linked to 4<sup>th</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> Seaforth Highlanders.

Grigor joined Lodge Rosehaugh on 9<sup>th</sup> January 1938 along with Hugh A Patience having their ballot declared clear earlier during the meeting (things done a bit different then!). On the 6<sup>th</sup> March Grigor was passed to the Fellow Craft and with Hugh A Patience and another Hugh Patience. On the 3 April 1939 both the forementioned Hugh's were raised to Master Mason but Grigor's name was missing. He had been called up, and served as transport Sergeant. Along with Neil Wilson PM, Grigor was captured at Saint Valery, France in 1940 and spent the next 5 years in a Prisoner of war camp. He did escape 3 times and was fortunate to escape being shot on the last occasion. Sadly, Bro Hugh A Patience was killed at Saint Valery.

Grigor's name next appears in the Lodge minutes at a special meeting held on the 16<sup>th</sup> May 1945. The minutes quote "Bro W Grigor Macintosh the first brother to return from a prisoner of war camp. Bro George Forsyth PM had kept the Lodge going all through the war years."

On the 21<sup>st</sup> May Grigor was finally raised to the High and Sublime degree of Master Mason.

Over the next fifty years Grigor was a fairly regular attendee. Indeed when the reconstruction of Lodge Rosehaugh took place in 1965 his expertise was invaluable as he was the electrician in charge.

In his latter years he had been confined to bed in the Marine Nursing Home where he certainly appreciated the visits from the Lodge Almoner Donald Jack and myself on many notable occasions.

Incidentally the late Hugh A Patience was an uncle of Bro David Patience PM.

### Carrot, Egg and Coffee

### Excerpts from the Past

The following was from the May 2004 edition

### Change:

I promised in the last edition that I would do my utmost to change the format of the Patter in order that it would be more readily accessible to everyone on-line and thereby cut down the paper and postage costs. Well here we are, my very first attempt to do the business in Microsoft Word rather than in my old favourite – Word Perfect. Hopefully, you will all be able to access this version without any problem.

It has taken me a considerable time to change from the system that I was familiar with and was comfortable with but, isn't that very often the case with all of us? We possess a natural trait to resist change but there are times when we have to change. That is the case with Freemasonry today. If we want to encourage young men of quality into the Craft and retain them we have no option but to change.

The Provinces, Districts and Daughter Lodges need to emulate the example set by Grand Lodge and embrace change - but, not just for the sake of change. We have to examine how best we can attain the objectives of attracting a new generation of members and keeping them interested and involved. We need to use techniques that have proved successful in other places being mindful that what works in one place may not work in another.

Of course many Brethren will resist any change that may emanate from such examination but we have to encourage and guide those Brethren through any resulting change for the greater good of the Craft.

It won't be easy but if we want to sustain our beloved Craft for future generations then we must face up to the challenges and face up to them sooner rather than later.

Nothing is out-with the bounds of possibility – if I can change from WordPerfect – then anything is possible.

TOOLS for MALAWI

I am delighted to be able to report that the tools collected by Brethren throughout the Province and by Brethren in our Sister Province of Fife and Kinross, have finally arrived in Malawi. The consignment arrived in Ekwandeni Hospital on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> April – some 500 miles north of the Mountain View School for Deaf Children. Bro Gordon Sheppard, Grand Superintendent of Malawi has arranged for Bro Graham Swart, RWM Lodge Viphya No 1571, to arrange for collection from Ekwandeni by one of his firm's trucks at the end of next week, for arrival in Blantyre over the weekend of 4th May which happens to be Lodge Viphya's Installation Meeting.

It has taken longer than we anticipated for the tools to arrive but nevertheless we acknowledge with gratitude the work of the Raven Trust who made it possible to get the nine crates of tools out to Malawi.

A considerable number of tools are now accumulating in my shed in Fortrose and I am aware that Bro Rev Andrew E Paterson, PGM of Fife & Kinross is also collecting more tools from throughout his Province. We hope to be able to send out a second batch in the autumn – so please don't discard any good second hand tools (especially woodworking tools) you may have – hold on to them and we will arrange to collect them shortly after the Lodges resume for the new session.

My sincere thanks to everyone who has contributed to the first consignment.

**LATEST NEWS** – as we go to print with this edition, I have received a letter from the Headmaster of the School, Cassidy Magreta. It is not good news. Basically, the Malawian Government have not paid wages for over three years and are doing their best to wash their hands of this school and two other similar schools. The only instructor who has been paid is the one we pay for. There are obviously other politics at work between the Mission who started the school and the Government but, as things stand at the moment, all three schools could be closed down – an appalling state of affairs that will leave those children who are profoundly deaf with nowhere to go. I have discussed the matter with the PGM and he has agreed that I approach the Scotland / Malawi Partnership (which we as a Province are members of) and ascertain if there is anything that they can do to influence the Government to support the school in terms of the original Memorandum of Understanding. Hopefully the school can be saved and we can continue to support it as we have in the past.
